HEAD START

An early education and comprehensive family support program provided at no cost to very low income families with 3-5 year old children. Our center-based or home-based options in Rock Island, Henry and Mercer Counties provide: health, disabilities, mental health, transportation, parent/family support and volunteer participation services.

ENROLLMENT

- ♦ 439 children from 401 families attended Head Start.
- ♦ Monthly average 360 children enrolled during school year and 80 children during the summer.
- ◆ 95.7% were from families at or below the poverty level and 4 children from homeless families..
- ♦ Over 10% were children diagnosed with treated dis-
- ♦ We transported 348 children to their Head Start classrooms.
- ♦ Over 30% of children spoke a language other than English in their homes.



ARRA dollars paid for all the college courses classroom staff took toward completing their Bachelor degrees.

MEDICAL/DENTAL EXAMS

- ♦ 100% received medical exams; and immunizations were up to date by year end.
- ♦ 98.6% received dental exams, and had their own dentist by the time they left the program.
- ♦ Of the age-eligible children 100% successfully transitioned into Kindergarten.

VOLUNTEERS

◆ 464 Head Start parents volunteered, 167 fathers or father-figures.

The Governor of Illinois chose Project NOW's Head Start as a **Center of Excellence!!** The most recent federal review brought a Blue Certificate for no findings.

The 2010 Head Start Program utilized \$2.87 Million of public funding and \$655,000 of private funding. The 2011 budget includes \$3.4 Million in public & private funding. Budget items include: Services/Personnel; In-Kind, Cost Allocations, Occupancy Cost, Nutrition/Food, Child Travel, Supplies, Furniture/Equipment/Vehicles, Other Child Costs, Staff Travel and Parent Services.



Project NOW's ability to Weatherize homes across our 3 county area was greatly impacted by ARRA over the past year. With an influx of funding, the number of staff and contractors more than doubled to weatherize more homes than ever before!!

AFFORDABLE HOUSING RENTALS

- 91 units of affordable housing were made available to families and individuals.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

The Community Services Division helps thousands of Customers to manage their basic needs while they move towards increased self-sufficiency. In 2010 we provided Outreach services *to 19,347 individuals across 8,849 households.*

BASIC NEEDS

- Rent & Deposit Assistance 341 Households, 209 of these were funded through ARRA's Homeless Prevention & Rapid Re-house Program.
- **767** families in crisis were helped with emergency needs including 145 families helped with emergency medical and dental needs.

- ARRA funds helped Local Food Pantries with \$50,000 in Food Costs to feed 16,000 households. 1,801 of these households came to Project NOW for their food pantry voucher.
- 65 individuals pursued their dreams of higher learning with CSBG **Scholarships** ranging from \$500—\$1,500.
- FARMER MARKET COUPONS! A great ARRA success story was the 1,591 households (2,756 individuals) who used 2,300 coupon booklets to purchase \$67,000 of fresh food at local Farmer's Markets.

UTILITY ASSISTANCE

- ♦ 9,867 homes were more livable because of LIHEAP heating/cooling assistance.
- \blacklozenge 216 homes received MidAmerican or Ameren Utility Assistance.
- 577 homes had help to get their utilities reconnected.
- ♦ 38 homes received Emergency Furnace Repair/Replacement.

<u>HOMELESS SERVICES</u> provides outreach, housing and intensive case management to Families, Youth and Single Women.

- ♦ Transitional Housing 38 Households/101 persons w/15,278 nights of shelter.
- ♦ Supportive Housing Case Management 28 households.
- ♦ Homeless Outreach 960 Households.

SENIOR SERVICES



The Rock Island County Senior Center offers a variety of services designed to help persons aged 60 and over live independently in their own homes.

TRANSPORTATION

◆ 8,451 units of door-to-door transportation provided to 567 Seniors in Rock Island and Mercer counties.



◆ RIDE THE RIM!! Project NOW expanded into Rural Transportation throughout rural Rock Island and Mercer Counties. 672 rides helped 91 individuals get to the destination of their choice.



MEALS

- 47,839 Congregate Meals helped 1,085 seniors eat more nutritionally.
- 66,063 Home-Delivered Meals helped 683 seniors live independently; with an additional 4,880 meals helping 39 especially frail seniors and disabled persons.



419 Seniors received 12,555 meals as a direct result of ARRA.
