



An Early Education Program focused on **Kindergarten Readiness Helps Families** Achieve Their Potential

ENROLLMENT


- 369 children from 335 families participated with an average monthly enrollment of **316**, or **96%** of the 330 funded children.
- 75% of enrolled children were at or below poverty level.
 6 were referred by child welfare; 1 child was homeless when they enrolled.
- **7.8%** of children were able to achieve their potential through treatment of their diagnosed disabilities by community partners.
- We were unable to serve **19** children due to wait lists at certain sites: **95%** of children who applied and were eligible were served.
- 30% of children spoke English as a second language.
- Children receive developmental, social, emotional, vision and hearing screenings within 45 days and follow-ups within 90 days of starting.

CHILD HEALTH

- 100% of children enrolled had immunizations, medical & dental exams by year end; 89% were current on preventative health care.
- 98% of families had doctors & dentists when they left Head Start.

RESOURCES

- 365 volunteers assisted our Head Start Program and 234 Head Start fathers/father figures participated in Head Start.
- We received \$663,071 in Donated Services including family engagement & space.
- The 2018-19 Head Start budget includes **\$3,078,927** in **public & private funding** plus \$724,733 in In-kind. Budget includes: personnel, in-kind, indirect costs, occupancy, equipment, vehicles, nutrition/food, travel, supplies, parent services and other child costs.

SENIOR SERVICES



Seniors (aged 60 & over) are able to live at home thanks to Meals, Transportation, Information/Assistance and Outreach.

106929 Units of Service were provided to 3,058 Seniors

Meals, Transportation, Clothing, Farmer Market Coupons, Utility Assistance, Information & Assistance, Outreach, Medicare Part D Information/Enrollment, Senior Health Insurance Program (SHIP) Counseling, Caregiver Assistance, Social Security Issues, Public Aid Application Assistance, Food Pantry Vouchers, Referrals to other services.

Transportation Services INTEGRATING SENIORS

• 7,083 One Way Rides provided to 334 Seniors in Rock Island and Mercer Counties—primarily to medical appointments & shopping.

Senior Meals IMPROVED NUTRITION & SOCIALIZATION

 15,467 meals were served to 380 seniors at 7 Meal Sites in Rock Island & Mercer Counties.

74,157 Home Delivered Meals were served to 644 Seniors thanks to a tremendous volunteer effort!

• 1,757 Seniors received 2,992 units of Info & Assistance. • 767 Seniors received 1,367 units of Outreach at home. 483 Seniors & Disabled Persons were helped with Benefit Access Applications to obtain free bus passes & discounted license plates.

• 325 Farmers Market Coupon Books (\$8,125) were passed out to Seniors for healthy food at local Farmers' Markets.



COMMUNITY SERVIC



IMPROVED LIVING CONDITIONS, STRONGER FAMILIES:

• 257 Families in crisis received emergency assistance, including 53 medical & dental needs.



• 600 vouchers were given to over 1200 customers who were in need of Clothing & Furniture. Clothing vouchers allow customers to shop for free at Project NOW's **Good** Things NOW Quality Used Clothing Stores. Stores are also open to

the general public who shop for everyday bargains. **HELPING CUSTOMERS ACHIEVE THEIR POTENTIAL:**

- Transitional Housing served 52 Families with 8,044 nights of **housing** and extensive case management. Program serves Homeless Families, Youth ages 16-21, and Single women @ Sojourner House.
- 3 Chronically Homeless Individuals (those who have been living in a shelter or on the street for a minimum of 365 days) received Permanent Supportive Housing Services including Case Management focused on keeping them housed and thriving.
- 50 Families received Supportive Housing Case Management.
- 210 Families/313 people received Rent/Deposit help.
- 16 Economic Development Scholarships were awarded to pay for job training classes for CNA, CDL & Welding certifications.
- **IMPROVED LIVING CONDITIONS Warm Homes:**
- 7,173 Families were kept warm thanks to Utility Assistance (LIHEAP) with an average benefit of \$562/family.
- 92 Families received extra energy-related help with water heaters, utility bills and other energy related minor repairs made possible by MidAmerican Energy & Ameren funding.
- 18 Families received Emergency Furnace Assistance.
